COMMISSION ON GEOGRAPHICAL EDUCATION NEWS

International Declaration on Research in Geography Education

The IGU Commission on Geographical Education has discussed in recent Steering Group meetings the development by the UK Committee of a draft **International Declaration on Research in Geography Education**. It has been agreed to take this forward, with the UK Committee leading this work. Two key documents that have been prepared:

- A brief Executive Statement;
- The full draft document: **International Declaration on Research in Geography Education**.

These have been posted on the IGU CGE website: <http://www.igu-cge.org/>. Both documents can be accessed through the link in the box at the top right on the Home page.

At the IGU Regional Conference in Krakow in August Professor Simon Catling gave a presentation about the development of the **International Declaration**. His Powerpoint slides are also posted on the IGU CGE website in the same area as the two **Declaration** documents. He outlines in his presentation the reasons and purpose for developing the **Declaration**.

The UK Committee has been asked to consult widely on the draft of the **Declaration**. It has been sent to the Chairs and/or Secretaries of each of the IGU Commissions and to a number of national geography and geography education associations and societies around the world. We are now asking you, the readers of the CGE Newsletter, to look at the two documents and to provide feedback about them. It will be valuable to have any suggestions, as well as to receive views about whether you support this initiative by the IGU CGE Steering Group and the UK Committee.

The deadline for receiving feedback is March 1st, 2015.

Please can you send your comments on and views about the **International Declaration** to Professor Simon Catling at sicatling@brookes.ac.uk. He has responsibility for this development on the UK Committee and will collect and collate your views.

It is anticipated that there will be a further opportunity to discuss the draft **International Declaration** at the CGE supported Geography Education Symposium in London in April 2015 (for further information see elsewhere in this Newsletter).

Michael Solem to receive 2015 AAG Grosvenor Honors in Geographic Education

Dr. Michael Solem, AAG Director of Educational Research and Programs, will be presented with the AAG Gilbert Grosvenor Honors in Geographic Education at the 2015 AAG Annual Meeting in Chicago. AAG Honors are the highest awards offered by the Association. They are offered annually to recognize outstanding accomplishments by members in research & scholarship, teaching, education, service to the discipline, public service outside academe and for lifetime achievement. AAG Honors remain among the most prestigious awards in American geography and have been awarded since 1951.

IGU CGE CONFERENCE NEWS

The meetings of the Commission on Geographical Education started with an interesting overview of geography education in Poland by Danuta Pirog. More than 20 people visited this Commission meeting. At the end of the congress week, 50 colleagues attended the closing meeting of the Commission on Geographical Education, which proved to be a lively and engaging event.

During the congress itself there were so many sessions of the Commission on Geographical Education that it was almost impossible to visit sessions of other commissions or task forces. We were delighted with the attendance and range of papers around geography education presented at this year's conference in Krakow. We had approximately 100 papers and 20 posters in the sessions of the Commission on Geographical Education. In addition Eyüp Artvinli and Danuta Pirog organised several interesting sessions about Teacher Education in Geography. Almost all sessions had a good number of participants and there were some excellent discussions.

Workshops for young academics with a specific focus on improving presentation skills (organised by IGU vice-president Joos Droogleever Fortuijn and Joop van der Schee) were a great success.

The social events in Krakow were also very well organised and certainly worth the trip, especially the one to the Wieliczka Salt Mine where an impressive gala dinner took place.

All by all a very good IGU congress in Krakow, many thanks to the local organizers. We hope that we can continue such high quality participation during our next meeting in Moscow.

A formal celebration will be held the week of the **National Conference on Geography Education** at the JW Marriott in Washington, DC. The conference will run from August 6-9, with pre-conference events starting on August 4. Proposal abstracts [ncge.org/proposal-page] will be accepted until February 1, 2015. From 1st to 6th October 2015 the **59th bi-annual meeting of German geographers** is taking place in Berlin. There will be 23 sessions explicitly concerned with geography education. Each of these sessions can adopt different formats (traditional conference session, round tables, workshops or interactive group discussions), depending on the choice of the respective chairs. 2015 AAG Annual Meeting: Chicago, Illinois

The 2015 AAG Annual Meeting will be held in Chicago, Illinois from April 21-25.

There will be a large number of geography education sessions on the program. One of the featured tracks is "Geography and Online Education", sponsored by the AAG, Esri and the National Center for Research in Geography Education (NCRGE). The track will include papers, panels and keynotes exploring frontiers of practice and research in online education.

The AAG has also organized two paper sessions on the topic of “International and Comparative Education”. Presenters from Japan, India, New Zealand, Germany, Sweden, Spain and the United States will focus on curricula, educational media, standards and other related topics inherent to geography teaching and learning in primary, secondary and higher education.

There will also be sessions for two of NCRGE’s current NSF-funded projects:

1) The GeoProgressions project will be on the program in the form of a panel and workshop. Participants from the October 2014 [GeoProgressions researcher-training workshop](#) will be on hand to discuss emerging research projects on learning progressions for maps, geospatial technology and spatial thinking. Delegates to the AAG Annual Meeting will also have an opportunity to attend a workshop and receive a [handbook](#) for doing learning progressions research.

2) There will also be a panel to present a progress report on NCRGE’s “Geospatial Resources, Materials and Tools for Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) Teacher Preparation” project. Researchers will demonstrate a ArcGIS Online-based teacher training RMT examining water usage and environmental impacts. The RMT is designed to support standards-based instruction in math, science, and social science, and is being tested with pre-service and in-service teachers at Texas State University and several Geographic Alliances. The panel will explain connections between the RMT and Esri’s ConnectED initiative and outline plans for future a NSF application for a national expansion of the project.

The outcomes from these writing workshops have been published in the Journal of Geography in Higher Education in Vols 30(1); 32(1); 35(3).

The aim of the network is to improve the quality and status of learning and teaching of geography in higher education internationally.

Rural writing retreat August 2014

Over thirty higher education geography academics and postgraduate students followed the Royal Geographical Society Annual Conference with a writing retreat in rural Surrey, UK. Participants came from nine countries and gathered in groups to write papers for the Journal of Geography in Higher Education (JGHE) at this year's INLT event. Topics included future directions for geography, communicating the value of geography, the location of geography within universities, the GeoCapabilities we develop in our students and GIS problem-based learning. Two further groups explored different aspects of students as partners in learning which had been related to the conference theme of Co-production.

News on Geography Education in Italy

Geography recovers one hour in secondary schools in Italy (Technical-Professional Institutes). This is today's positive result following the harsh penalisation that the subject underwent in the 2010-11 reform, thanks also to considerable international mobilisation, which actively answered the appeal launched by the Italian geographers and the Italian Association of Geography Teachers (see: <http://www.j-reading.org/index.php/geography/pages/view/editoriale>).

GeoCapabilities update

GeoCapabilities is an international collaborative project researching the purposes and values of geography in secondary schools. It is based on Amartya Sen and Martha Nussbaum's ideas for a "capabilities approach" to human welfare development. Through international comparative methods, the project seeks to identify the ways geography education is contributing to human potential and wellbeing in diverse contexts.

GeoCapabilities staff are developing an online teacher-training course designed to prepare geography teachers to apply the capabilities approach for curriculum making in schools. The course will be previewed at workshops scheduled for the 2015 AAG Annual Meeting in Chicago and the 2015 EUGEO conference in Budapest. For further details, visit www.geocapabilities.org. GeoProgressions research handbook and workshop

How do children progress in their knowledge and understanding of geographic and spatial concepts? What are the influences of maps and geospatial technologies in that learning process?

Questions of this nature are at the heart of the GeoProgressions project, funded by the U.S. National Science Foundation to build capacity for researching learning progressions in geography.

A GeoProgressions workshop held in Washington, D.C. on October 9-12, 2014 has organized and prepared teams of researchers to carry out core foundational research on learning progressions for maps, geospatial technology and spatial thinking. To support their efforts, the project published a research handbook that presents examples of learning progressions and research models from math and science education.

Esri-ConnectED launches program providing free ArcGIS Online accounts to schools

ConnectED is President Obama's initiative to lever contributions by technology industry leaders like Microsoft, Amazon, Esri, and others to help propel U.S. K-12 education toward a digital future. Esri's contribution to ConnectED began with its offer to donate ArcGIS Online subscriptions to every public, private and home school in the U.S. The contribution sets the stage for transformative advancements in the capacity of American schools to enhance the geographic literacy and proficiency of elementary and secondary students in STEM classrooms.

In fall 2014, Esri, along with collaborators including AAG, GISCI, Maps.com, statewide Geography Alliances, and the University of Minnesota, launched a program to support meaningful adoptions of ArcGIS Online at 25,000 schools. At the same time, new research led by the National Center for Research in Geography Education (NCRGE) has investigated how ArcGIS Online and related technologies will potentially operate within interdisciplinary STEM pedagogical frameworks.

The Esri-ConnectED support strategy consists of substantial new efforts to (1) create standards-based curricular solutions that educators across a spectrum of subject areas can adopt with ease; (2) create and curate the collection of publicly-available webmap content upon which the solutions are based; (3) greatly expand teacher professional development opportunities with ArcGIS Online; and (4) establish a nationwide network of GIS professionals and adult students who volunteer to help teachers as "geomentors."
